The Royal Society of Medicine is proud to be associated with *The Annual Register* in its 250th year.

*The Annual Register* has recorded the major medical discoveries of the last 250 years and celebrated the lives of eminent medical men and women. In the early years papers were submitted to *The Annual Register* by the anatomist and surgeon John Hunter (AR 1780), by his pupil Edward Jenner (AR 1788), and by his brother-in-law, Sir Everard Home (AR 1805). Meetings of medical societies, both national and international, have been chronicled. The inaugural dinner to celebrate the formation of the Royal Society of Medicine in 1907 was reported in *The Annual Register*, as was the opening of the Society's new building at 1 Wimpole Street (AR 1912).

The Royal Society of Medicine—which is dedicated to the promotion of multi-disciplinary education and professional matters relating to medicine, dentistry, veterinary medicine and their allied professions—greatly values the link with *The Annual Register*, which gives its membership an abundance of information, not only related to biological sciences and medicine but also to events occurring throughout the world, in the arts, the law, religion and sport. This provides, together with the online archive of the whole *Annual Register*, an invaluable asset for historians.
